Part 1, Volume 1: How Can It Be?

**SERIES INTRO**: He was a doctor - a scientist trained to do meticulous research in pursuit of the truth. He was also an educated Gentile who became the only non-Jewish author of the Bible. And in the middle of the first century AD, this man devoted his life to answering one question: **Can Christianity be trusted?** 

His name was Luke, and after years of researching the extraordinary claims being made by a small, highly motivated sect called *The Way,* he became an unlikely disciple of Jesus. How could a reasonable researcher come to believe that a 1st Century Jewish rabbi who was executed by the Romans is the living Son of God? We'll explore this question and more at The Story Church throughout this 22-week series as we follow Luke's logic from the Christmas manger to Easter's empty tomb.

REFLECTION QUESTION: If someone asked you, "What makes you so SURE about Jesus and Christianity?" what would you say?

READ: Luke 1:1-4 - Many have undertaken to draw up an account of the things that have been fulfilled among us, just as they were handed down to us by those who from the first were eyewitnesses and servants of the word. With this in mind, since I myself have carefully investigated everything from the beginning, I too decided to write an orderly account for you, most excellent Theophilus, so that you may know the certainty of the things you have been taught.

How would you describe Luke's purpose for writing this book?

How does Luke's use of the word "certainty" to describe Christian faith sit with you? How "certain" are you about Christianity's truth-claims, and why?

#### HOW CAN WE BE CERTAIN...about LUKE?

READ: Colossians 3:7-14 - Tychicus will tell you all the news about me. He is a dear brother, a faithful minister and fellow servant in the Lord. I am sending him to you for the express purpose that you may know about our circumstances and that he may encourage your hearts. He is coming with Onesimus, our faithful and dear brother, who is one of you. They will tell you everything that is happening here.

My fellow prisoner Aristarchus sends you his greetings, as does Mark, the cousin of Barnabas. (You have received instructions about him; if he comes to you, welcome him.) Jesus, who is called Justus, also sends greetings. These are the only Jews among my co-workers for the kingdom of God, and they have proved a comfort to me. Epaphras, who is one of you and a servant of Christ Jesus, sends greetings. He is always wrestling in prayer for you, that you may stand firm in all the will of God, mature and fully assured. I vouch for him that he is working hard for you and for those at Laodicea and Hierapolis. Our dear friend Luke, the doctor, and Demas send greetings. Give my greetings to the brothers and sisters at Laodicea, and to Nympha and the church in her house.

READ: 2 Timothy 4:9-13 - Do your best to come to me quickly, for Demas, because he loved this world, has deserted me and has gone to Thessalonica. Crescens has gone to Galatia, and Titus to Dalmatia. Only Luke is with me. Get Mark and bring him with you, because he is helpful to me in my ministry. I sent Tychicus to Ephesus. When you come, bring the cloak that I left with Carpus at Troas, and my scrolls, especially the parchments.

What insights do these passages offer about Luke?

For Christians, what role do facts and historical truth play in our certainty about Jesus?

What other factors may contribute to our certainty about Christianity's Truth claims?

**SERIES INTRO**: He was a doctor - a scientist trained to do meticulous research in pursuit of the truth. He was also an educated Gentile who became the only non-Jewish author of the Bible. And in the middle of the first century AD, this man devoted his life to answering one question: **Can Christianity be trusted?** 

His name was Luke, and after years of researching the extraordinary claims being made by a small, highly motivated sect called *The Way*, he became an unlikely disciple of Jesus. How could a reasonable researcher come to believe that a 1st Century Jewish rabbi who was executed by the Romans is the living Son of God? We'll explore this question and more at The Story Church throughout this 22-week series as we follow Luke's logic from the Christmas manger to Easter's empty tomb.

<u>REFLECTION QUESTION:</u> Think of a time when you asked God for something, and it just... didn't...happen, or it took way longer than you felt like it should have. How did that time you spent waiting on God affect your faith in Him? What did you learn during that season?

The last books of the Old Testament were written around 400 years before the birth of Jesus. What were the people of Israel waiting for throughout those four centuries?

**READ:** Malachi 4:5-6 - "See, I will send the prophet Elijah to you before that great and dreadful day of the Lord comes. He will turn the hearts of the parents to their children, and the hearts of the children to their parents; or else I will come and strike the land with total destruction."

**READ:** Luke 1:5-17 - In the time of Herod king of Judea there was a priest named Zechariah, who belonged to the priestly division of Abijah; his wife Elizabeth was also a descendant of Aaron. Both of them were righteous in the sight of God, observing all the Lord's commands and decrees blamelessly. But they were childless because Elizabeth was not able to conceive, and they were both very old.

Once when Zechariah's division was on duty and he was serving as priest before God, he was chosen by lot, according to the custom of the priesthood, to go into the temple of the Lord and burn incense. And when the time for the burning of incense came, all the assembled worshipers were praying outside.

Then an angel of the Lord appeared to him, standing at the right side of the altar of incense. When Zechariah saw him, he was startled and was gripped with fear. But the angel said to him: "Do not be afraid, Zechariah; your prayer has been heard. Your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son, and you are to call him John. He will be a joy and delight to you, and many will rejoice because of his birth, for he will be great in the sight of the Lord. He is never to take wine or other fermented drink, and he will be filled with the Holy Spirit even before he is born. He will bring back many of the people of Israel to the Lord their God. And he will go on before the Lord, in the spirit and power of Elijah, to turn the hearts of the parents to their children and the disobedient to the wisdom of the righteous—to make ready a people prepared for the Lord."

Part Three: Why Does Mary's Virginity Matter?

<u>SERIES INTRO</u>: He was a doctor - a scientist trained to do meticulous research in pursuit of the truth. He was also an educated Gentile who became the only non-Jewish author of the Bible. And in the middle of the first century AD, this man devoted his life to answering one question: *Can Christianity be trusted?* 

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<u>REFLECTION QUESTION:</u> Have you ever felt called by God - or simply compelled by your conscience - to do something extraordinary that would make a difference in the world, only to have that feeling stifled by the belief that you're underqualified or ill-equipped to do what needs to be done? Reflect on this question for a few minutes, and write down your thoughts here:

What do we know about Mary's background and life before she became the mother of Jesus?

**READ:** Luke 1:26-38 - In the sixth month of Elizabeth's pregnancy, God sent the angel Gabriel to Nazareth, a town in Galilee, to a virgin pledged to be married to a man named Joseph, a descendant of David. The virgin's name was Mary. The angel went to her and said, "Greetings, you who are highly favored! The Lord is with you." Mary was greatly troubled at his words and wondered what kind of greeting this might be. But the angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary; you have found favor with God. You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you are to call him Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give him the throne of his father David, and he will reign over Jacob's descendants forever; his kingdom will never end."

"How will this be," Mary asked the angel, "since I am a virgin?" The angel answered, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. So the holy one to be born will be called the Son of God. Even Elizabeth, your relative, is going to have a child in her old age, and she who was said to be unable to conceive is in her sixth month. For no word from God will ever fail."

"I am the Lord's servant," Mary answered. "May your word to me be fulfilled." Then the angel left her.

How did Mary's age and marital/sexual status make her an unlikely candidate to conceive, carry, and deliver the most important child in human history?

What stands out to you about Mary's conversation with the angel, and why?

Many people - including many Christians and former Christians - struggle with the notion of the Virgin Birth. Why is it hard for folks to accept the idea of Jesus being born of a virgin?

Even though Mary was clearly more than a virgin, her virginity is the one characteristic that she's known to this day. Why is that, and how and when did Church teachings like "The Perpetual Virginity of Mary" and "The Immaculate Conception" develop?

As misguided as some of the Church's teachings about Mary have been throughout the years, her status as a virgin in Luke 1 is a critically important detail in the story of Jesus' life. Let's explore what Mary's virginity does mean, and what it *doesn't* mean.

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**REFLECTION QUESTION:** Are you baptized? If so, what does your baptism mean to you? If not, why have you chosen not to be baptized?

**READ:** Luke 3:2-3, 7-8, 21-23 "...the word of God came to John, son of Zechariah, in the wilderness. He went into all the country around the Jordan (River), preaching a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins... John said to the crowds coming out to be baptized by him, 'You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath? Produce fruit in keeping with repentance...' When all the people were being baptized, Jesus was baptized too. And as he was praying, heaven was opened and the Holy Spirit descended on him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven: 'You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased.' Now Jesus himself was about thirty years old when he began his ministry.

What role does repentance play within the Christian worldview? Why is it essential?

Do you agree with the claim that everyone, regardless of their religion or lack thereof, believes in sin? Why or why not?

How would you compare Christianity's "solution" to the problem of sin with the solutions offered by other religions and worldviews?

If sin is primarily about repentance, and if Jesus was sinless, then why was Jesus baptized? (see: Matthew 3:14-15)

**READ:** 2 Corinthians 5:21 "God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God."

How did the baptism and subsequent crucifixion of Jesus change everything in regard to our sin? What difference does it make?

How did each member of the Trinity show up at Jesus' baptism, and what might this teach us about the unique roles of the Father, Son, and Spirit in our lives today?

Why is belief in (or relationship with) just one or two Persons of the Trinity incomplete? In other words, how might we characterize "belief" in God and/or the Spirit without belief in the Son? Or what is someone missing when they acknowledge God the Father and the Son but deny or ignore the Spirit?

Volume 3: Son of God, Son of Man Part Three: A Warning to Rich Christians

**SERIES INTRO**: He was a doctor - a scientist trained to do meticulous research in pursuit of the truth. He was also an educated Gentile who became the only non-Jewish author of the Bible. And in the middle of the first century AD, this man devoted his life to answering one question: **Can Christianity be trusted?** 

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**REFLECTION QUESTION:** What do you think is your biggest spiritual "blind spot"? In other words, what topic, temptation, circumstance, etc., tends to knock you off the godly path you're trying to walk?

Today, we'll mine one of Jesus' most provocative and difficult teachings - especially for those of us who are relatively wealthy, well-fed, and comfortable. In this passage, Jesus gave us the good news, and the bad news. Let's start with the good news:

<u>Luke 6:17-23</u> He went down with them and stood on a level place. A large crowd of his disciples was there and a great number of people from all over Judea, from Jerusalem, and from the coastal region around Tyre and Sidon, who had come to hear him and to be healed of their diseases. Those troubled by impure spirits were cured, and the people all tried to touch him, because power was coming from him and healing them all.

Looking at his disciples, he said: "Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God.

Blessed are you who hunger now, for you will be satisfied.

Blessed are you who weep now, for you will laugh.

Blessed are you when people hate you, when they exclude you and insult you and reject your name as evil because of the Son of Man. Rejoice in that day and leap for joy, because great is your reward in heaven. For that is how their ancestors treated the prophets."

Why is it important to note that Jesus said "YOU who are poor...YOU who hunger now...etc.," (as opposed to "Blessed are THE poor...Blessed are THOSE who hunger...etc")? Who, exactly, did Jesus declare as "blessed"?

How could things like poverty, hunger, sadness, and persecution be considered as blessings?

Have you ever experienced hardship or discomfort as a blessing from God?

Now, let's get to the "bad news" in this teaching from Jesus:

Luke 6:24-26 "But woe to you who are rich, for you have already received your comfort.

Woe to you who are well fed now, for you will go hungry.

Woe to you who laugh now, for you will mourn and weep.

Woe to you when everyone speaks well of you, for that is how their ancestors treated the false prophets.

**REFLECTION QUESTION:** We typically use the phrase "a come-to-Jesus meeting" to refer to a scary or intimidating encounter with an authority figure, but this idiom is rooted in the historically Christian idea that, one day, everyone will stand face-to-face with Jesus. So, as a way of kick-starting your personal reflection and/or your group's discussion, what is the first thing you think you'll say or do when your "come-to-Jesus meeting" happens in the hereafter?

Today's reading (Luke 8:40-56) picks up just as Jesus was sailing across the Sea of Galilee to Capernaum after preaching in Samaria. Think for a moment about the kind of man that Jesus really was. How do you think people today mischaracterize Jesus in terms of his personality and identity?

<u>Luke 8:40-42</u> Now when Jesus returned, a crowd welcomed him, for they were all expecting him. Then a man named Jairus, a synagogue leader, came and fell at Jesus' feet, pleading with him to come to his house because his only daughter, a girl of about twelve, was dying. As Jesus was on his way, the crowds almost crushed him.

Who was Jairus, and what brought him to Jesus that day?

What kinds of circumstances cause people to *desperately* come to Jesus, and what are they typically searching for?

<u>Luke 8:43-44</u> And a woman was there who had been subject to bleeding for twelve years, but no one could heal her. She came up behind him and touched the edge of his cloak, and immediately her bleeding stopped.

What do we know about this woman? What brought her to Jesus that day?

What circumstances lead people to feel *disappointed* when they come to Jesus? What are they usually hoping for?

<u>Luke 8:45-48</u> "Who touched me?" Jesus asked. When they all denied it, Peter said, "Master, the people are crowding and pressing against you." But Jesus said, "Someone touched me; I know that power has gone out from me." Then the woman, seeing that she could not go unnoticed, came trembling and fell at his feet. In

the presence of all the people, she told why she had touched him and how she had been instantly healed. Then he said to her, "Daughter, your faith has healed you. Go in peace."

Why was the woman trembling?

What was the significance of Jesus calling her his "daughter"?

Luke 8:49-56 While Jesus was still speaking, someone came from the house of Jairus, the synagogue leader. "Your daughter is dead," he said. "Don't bother the teacher anymore." Hearing this, Jesus said to Jairus, "Don't be afraid; just believe, and she will be healed." When he arrived at the house of Jairus, he did not let anyone go in with him except Peter, John and James, and the child's father and mother. Meanwhile, all the people were wailing and mourning for her. "Stop wailing," Jesus said. "She is not dead but asleep." They laughed at him, knowing that she was dead. But he took her by the hand and said, "My child, get up!" Her spirit returned, and at once she stood up. Then Jesus told them to give her something to eat. Her parents were astonished, but he ordered them not to tell anyone what had happened.

Who were those wailing and mourning people at Jairus' house, and why did they laugh?

What circumstances lead people to be disrespectful or arrogant when they come to Jesus?

The disciples were also present with Jesus throughout today's reading. How had they come to Jesus (see Luke 5:1-11), and what roles did they play in today's reading from Luke 8:40-56?

What circumstances lead people to become disciples who follow Jesus?

So, in this story we have 4 people/groups: the DESPERATE father, the DISAPPOINTED woman, the DISRESPECTFUL cynics, and the DISCIPLES of Jesus. Which person or group do you find the most relatable, and why?

If you don't yet consider yourself to be a disciple of Jesus, what circumstances would need to change in order for you to become one?

What does today's reading reveal to you about the heart and personality of Jesus Christ?

But unless you repent, you too will all perish." - Luke 13:1-5

How did Jesus respond to the report from the people that Pontius Pilate had slaughtered a group of Galileans in or near the Temple? How might Jesus' response have been surprising or unexpected?

What happened when the Siloam tower fell? Why did Jesus bring up this tragedy while responding to Pilate's atrocities? What did these two tragedies have in common, and how were they different?

What point was Jesus making about the larger question of why bad things happen to good people? Also, from the Christian point of view, what's wrong with the notion that "bad things" happen to "good people"?

There is one phrase that Jesus repeats, verbatim, in this passage. What is it, and why is it important?

What is "the fruit of repentance," and where else is it mentioned in Luke's gospel?

To make sense of this passage, let's read on to the next passage from Luke, in which Jesus told a parable to illustrate his point:

Then he told this parable: "A man had a fig tree growing in his vineyard, and he went to look for fruit on it but did not find any. So he said to the man who took care of the vineyard, 'For three years now I've been coming to look for fruit on this fig tree and haven't found any. Cut it down! Why should it use up the soil?'

"Sir,' the man replied, 'leave it alone for one more year, and I'll dig around it and fertilize it. If it bears fruit next year, fine! If not, then cut it down." - Luke 13:6-9

<u>REFLECTION QUESTION:</u> Have you ever gotten lost? (This is a practical question, not a spiritual one) If so, how exactly did you get lost? What happened that led to your lostness, and how did you find your way back?

In Luke 15, Jesus told three stories, or *parables*, that illustrate four of the most common ways that people get lost. Let's take a look at these stories, one at a time.

Luke 15:1-7 Now the tax collectors and sinners were all gathering around to hear Jesus. But the Pharisees and the teachers of the law muttered, "This man welcomes sinners and eats with them." Then Jesus told them this parable: "Suppose one of you has a hundred sheep and loses one of them. Doesn't he leave the ninety-nine in the open country and go after the lost sheep until he finds it? And when he finds it, he joyfully puts it on his shoulders and goes home. Then he calls his friends and neighbors together and says, 'Rejoice with me; I have found my lost sheep.' I tell you that in the same way there will be more rejoicing in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who do not need to repent.

What circumstances provoked Jesus to tell this story?

How did the sheep most likely get lost?

What stands out to you about the shepherd's behavior in this parable?

What does this parable teach us about how some people get lost, and how God feels about them?

**Lk 15:8-10** "Or suppose a woman has ten silver coins and loses one. Doesn't she light a lamp, sweep the house and search carefully until she finds it? And when she finds it, she calls her friends and neighbors together and says, 'Rejoice with me; I have found my lost coin.' In the same way, I tell you, there is rejoicing in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents."

How did the coin most likely get lost?

What stands out to you about the woman's behavior in this parable?

What does this parable teach us about how some people get lost, and how God feels toward them?

**Lk. 15:11-24** Jesus continued: "There was a man who had two sons. The younger one said to his father, 'Father, give me my share of the estate.' So he divided his property between them. Not long after that, the younger son got together all he had, set off for a distant country and there squandered his wealth in wild living. After he had spent everything, there was a severe famine in that whole country, and he began to be in need. So he went and hired himself out to a citizen of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed pigs. He longed to fill his stomach with the pods that the pigs were eating, but no one gave him anything. When he came to his senses, he said, 'How many of my father's hired servants have food to spare, and here I am starving to death! I will set out and go back to my father and say to him: Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I am no longer worthy to be called your son; make me like one of your hired servants.' So he got up and went to his father.

But while he was still a long way off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion for him; he ran to his son, threw his arms around him and kissed him. Read Exodus 12:1-30. What exactly did the Lord instruct the Israelites to do and why?

How did the Jewish observance of Passover evolve prior to the life and times of Jesus Christ? What did the bread and wine symbolize according to Hebrew tradition?

Read Luke 22:7-13 Then came the day of Unleavened Bread on which the Passover lamb had to be sacrificed. Jesus sent Peter and John, saying, "Go and make preparations for us to eat the Passover." "Where do you want us to prepare for it?" they asked. He replied, "As you enter the city, a man carrying a jar of water will meet you. Follow him to the house that he enters, and say to the owner of the house, 'The Teacher asks: Where is the guest room, where I may eat the Passover with my disciples?' He will show you a large room upstairs, all furnished. Make preparations there." They left and found things just as Jesus had told them. So they prepared the Passover. When the hour came, Jesus and his apostles reclined at the table. And he said to them, "I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer. For I tell you, I will not eat it again until it finds fulfillment in the kingdom of God." After taking the cup, he gave thanks and said, "Take this and divide it among you. For I tell you I will not drink again from the fruit of the vine until the kingdom of God comes." And he took bread, gave thanks and broke it, and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body given for you; do this in remembrance of me." In the same way, after the supper he took the

cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which is poured out for you. But the hand of him who is going to betray me is with mine on the table. The Son of Man will go as it has been decreed. But woe to that man who betrays him!" They began to question among themselves which of them it might be who would do this.

## A Physician and the Facts: Luke's Pursuit of the Truth

Part 22 of 22: Emmaus: But We Had Hoped...

**SERIES INTRO**: He was a doctor - a scientist trained to do meticulous research in pursuit of the truth. He was also an educated Gentile who became the only non-Jewish author of the Bible. And in the middle of the first century AD, this man devoted his life to answering one question: **Can Christianity be trusted?** 

His name was Luke, and after years of researching the extraordinary claims being made by a small, highly motivated sect called *The Way*, he became an unlikely disciple of Jesus. How could a reasonable researcher come to believe that a 1st Century Jewish rabbi who was executed by the Romans is the living Son of God? We'll explore this question and more at The Story Church throughout this 22-week series as we follow Luke's logic from the Christmas manger to Easter's empty tomb.

<u>REFLECTION QUESTION:</u> How has this journey through Luke changed your perspective of Jesus, his mission in the world, and the Bible more broadly?

Today as we near the end of this series, we're taking a closer look at one of Luke's greatest gifts to the Church: the story of what happened on the Emmaus Road. Luke's Gospel is the only one of the four gospels to record these events. Given what we know about his background, as well as his approach to writing his gospel, why and how might Luke have included content that other gospel writers didn't?

**Luke 24:13-27** Now that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem. They were talking with each other about everything that had happened. As they talked and discussed these things with each other, Jesus himself came up and walked along with them; but they were kept from recognizing him.

He asked them, "What are you discussing together as you walk along?" They stood still, their faces downcast. One of them, named Cleopas, asked him, "Are you the only one visiting Jerusalem who does not know the things that have happened there in these days?"

"What things?" he asked. "About Jesus of Nazareth," they replied. "He was a prophet, powerful in word and deed before God and all the people. The chief priests and our rulers handed him over to be sentenced to death, and they crucified him; but we had hoped that he was the one who was going to redeem Israel. And what is more, it is the third day since all this took place. In addition, some of our women amazed us. They went to the tomb early this morning but didn't find his body. They came and told us that they had seen a vision of angels, who said he was alive. Then some of our companions went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said, but they did not see Jesus."

He said to them, "How foolish you are, and how slow to believe all that the prophets have spoken! Did not the Messiah have to suffer these things and then enter his glory?" And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he explained to them what was said in all the Scriptures concerning himself.

Who were these two people, why had they been in Jerusalem?

Why were their faces downcast?

Who did they expect Jesus to be like, and what did they hope that he would do?

How did Jesus respond to what they said?

<u>Luke 24:28-35</u> As they approached the village to which they were going, Jesus continued on as if he were going farther. But they urged him strongly, "Stay with us, for it is nearly evening; the day is almost over." So he went in to stay with them. When he was at the table with them, he took bread, gave thanks, broke it and began to give it to them. Then their eyes were opened and they recognized him, and he disappeared from their sight. They asked each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he talked with us on the road and opened the Scriptures to us?"

They got up and returned at once to Jerusalem. There they found the Eleven and those with them, assembled together and saying, "It is true! The Lord has risen and has appeared to Simon." Then the two told what had happened on the way, and how Jesus was recognized by them when he broke the bread.

Why were these two disciples unable to recognize Jesus prior to verse 31?

What are some of the misunderstandings, partial understandings, or false expectations about Jesus that believers struggle with today?

Why might a partial understanding of Jesus be so dangerous?

Only after Jesus explained to them everything the Scriptures said concerning him, and after he took bread, gave thanks, broke it, and gave it to them were they able to recognize him for who he is. **What changed that allowed their eyes to be opened?**
