Part 2 of 4: Are You Born Again?

SERIES INTRO: "By baptism, we enter into a covenant with God, an everlasting covenant, we are admitted into the church, made members of Christ, made children of God. By the water of baptism, we are born again." - John Wesley

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REFLECTION QUESTION: Do you consider yourself a "born-again Christian"? If not, why not? If so, do you acknowledge your born-again identity publicly? Why or why not?

Do you believe that everyone who's been baptized is "born again"? Has everyone who is "born again" been baptized?

Let's talk about the intersection of baptism and born-again Christianity by reading John's Gospel.

John 3:1-2 Now there was a Pharisee, a man named Nicodemus who was a member of the Jewish ruling council. He came to Jesus at night and said, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God. For no one could perform the signs you are doing if God were not with him."

Who were the Pharisees? Who was Nicodemus? Why might he have come to see Jesus at night?

John 3:3-8 Jesus replied, "Very truly I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God unless they are born again." "How can someone be born when they are old?" Nicodemus asked. "Surely they cannot enter a second time into their mother's womb to be born!" Jesus answered, "Very truly I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God unless they are born of water and the Spirit. Flesh gives birth to flesh, but the Spirit gives birth to spirit. You should not be surprised at my saying, 'You must be born again.' The wind blows wherever it pleases. You hear its sound, but you cannot tell where it comes from or where it is going. So it is with everyone born of the Spirit."

How did Nicodemus' super-literal retort to Jesus expose the state of his heart? What was he missing?

What did Jesus most likely mean when he said "...unless they are born of water and the Spirit"? How do other passages from Scripture support this?

Ezekiel 36:25-27 I will sprinkle *clean water* on you, and you will be clean; I will *cleanse you* from all your impurities and from all your idols. I will give you a new heart and *put a new spirit* in you; I will remove from you your heart of stone and *give you a heart of flesh*. And I will put *my Spirit in you* and move you to follow my decrees and be careful to keep my laws.

Biblically speaking, what does God do to us with WATER? ...and with SPIRIT?

Putting aside modern-day stereotypes, what does it actually mean to be *born-again* according to Jesus and to the entirety of God's Word?

2 Corinthians 5:17 If anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!

1 Peter 1:3 Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead...

<u>James 1:17-18</u> Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of the heavenly lights, who does not change like shifting shadows. He chose to give us birth through the word of truth...

What is so important to understand about the idea of being BORN (versus being good, for example)?

John 3:9-18 "How can this be?" Nicodemus asked. "You are Israel's teacher," said Jesus, "and do you not understand these things? Very truly I tell you, we speak of what we know, and we testify to what we have seen, but still you people do not accept our testimony. I have spoken to you of earthly things and you do not believe; how then will you believe if I speak of heavenly things? No one has ever gone into heaven except the one who came from heaven—the Son of Man. Just as Moses lifted up the snake in the wilderness, so the Son of Man must be lifted up, that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him."

For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him. Whoever believes in him is not condemned, but whoever does not believe stands condemned already because they have not believed in the name of God's one and only Son.

Why would Jesus' message of salvation by grace through faith have been so shocking to Nicodemus?

What do we know about Nicodemus' life after this late-night encounter with Jesus? (see John 7:45-52 and John 19:38-39) Do you think he was born-again? Why or why not?

What difference does it make in a person's life when God makes them a new creation?

How has this message, these Bible passages, and/or God's Spirit changed your understanding of what it means to be a born-again believer? If you haven't considered yourself "born again" in the past, are you open to being born again by water and the Spirit? Why or why not?

Part 3 of 4: Why Do We Baptize Babies?

SERIES INTRO: "By baptism, we enter into a covenant with God, an everlasting covenant, we are admitted into the church, made members of Christ, made children of God. By the water of baptism, we are born again." - John Wesley

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REFLECTION QUESTION: OK, let's cut to the chase. Prior to hearing this message, what was your opinion of infant baptism? How did you reach your conclusions?

What are the two largest schools of thought when it comes to Christian baptism, and how do they differ?

How many examples of infants and young children being baptized are found in the Bible? Is that alone reason enough to reject infant baptism? Why or why not?

How should Christians proceed when disagreements arise among believers that are not clearly resolved in Scripture?

Genesis 17:3-12 Abram fell facedown, and God said to him, "As for me, this is my covenant with you: You will be the father of many nations. No longer will you be called Abram; your name will be Abraham, for I have made you a father of many nations. I will make you very fruitful; I will make nations of you, and kings will come from you. I will establish my covenant as an everlasting covenant between me and you and your descendants after you for the generations to come, to be your God and the God of your descendants after you. The whole land of Canaan, where you now reside as a foreigner, I will give as an everlasting possession to you and your descendants after you; and I will be their God."

Then God said to Abraham, "As for you, you must keep my covenant, you and your descendants after you for the generations to come. This is my covenant with you and your descendants after you, the covenant you are to keep: Every male among you shall be circumcised. You are to undergo circumcision, and it will be the sign of the covenant between me and you. For the generations to come every male among you who is eight days old must be circumcised..."

What was circumcision meant to signify?
At what age were Israelite males to be circumcised?

Genesis 21:1-4 Now the Lord was gracious to Sarah as he had said, and the Lord did for Sarah what he had promised. Sarah became pregnant and bore a son to Abraham in his old age, at the very time God had promised him. Abraham gave the name Isaac to the son Sarah bore him. When his son Isaac was eight days old, Abraham circumcised him, as God commanded him.

Why did Abraham circumcise Isaac as an infant instead of waiting until his son was old enough to choose it for himself?

Luke 2:4-7, 21 So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no guest room available for them... On the eighth day, when it was time to circumcise the child, he was named Jesus, the name the angel had given him before he was conceived.

At what age was Jesus circumcised, and why?

Whereas in the Old Testament, circumcision was the sign of the covenant, baptism became the sign of the new covenant in the New Testament. Read Jesus' *Great Commission* below. What did he tell his disciples to do? Notably, especially for a group of devout Jews, what did he *not* tell them to do?

Matthew 28:18-20 Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

While both circumcision and baptism are described in the Bible as signs of God's covenants (old and new, respectively), there are some important differences between the two rituals. What are they?

Because circumcision (under the old covenant) and baptism (under the new) are *signs* of our salvation (and not the *substance* of it), neither sign has the power to *save* us (see passage from Romans 2 below). Why is this an important clue to understanding the biblical case for infant baptism?

Romans 2:25-29 Circumcision has value if you observe the law, but if you break the law, you have become as though you had not been circumcised. So then, if those who are not circumcised keep the law's requirements, will they not be regarded as though they were circumcised? The one who is not circumcised physically and yet obeys the law will condemn you who, even though you have the written code and circumcision, are a lawbreaker. A person is not a Jew who is one only outwardly, nor is circumcision merely outward and physical. No, a person is a Jew who is one inwardly; and circumcision is circumcision of the heart, by the Spirit, not by the written code. Such a person's praise is not from other people, but from God.

At what point did the Christian Church begin baptizing children and infants? How do we know? If baptizing infants is so clearly unbiblical, as some might say, then why is there no evidence of church fathers criticizing this practice as they so often did when heresies arose among the churches?

Whenever we baptize infants, what are we doing? And what are we not doing?

Are you (and your children, if you have kids) baptized? If so, what does that mean to you? If not, why not?
